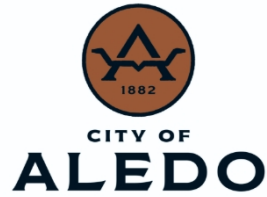

1. Call to Order

Mayor Shane Davis called the meeting to order at 05:30 PM.

3. Regular Agenda

a. FY 2026 Budget Review

Candice Edmondson, City Manager, gave the following report to Council:

General Fund

- a. The General Fund remains in a strong position at mid-year, with revenues at approximately 85% of budget while expenditures are tracking at 50% of budget, resulting in a current surplus of approximately \$1.6 million.
- a. Sales tax revenues continue to perform well, with both General Fund and AEDC sales tax collections trending ahead of budget projections at mid-year.
- b. Property tax revenues have already exceeded annual budget projections at the halfway point of the fiscal year, reflecting strong collections.

Enterprise Fund

- a. The Water/Wastewater Fund remains financially stable overall, with revenues exceeding expenditures by approximately \$979,000 at mid-year. Impact fee revenue has significantly outperformed projections, reaching approximately 193% of budget.
- b. Several wastewater operational accounts are currently tracking above budget due to

ongoing operational and infrastructure needs, but staff will continue monitoring expenditures closely as part of the year-end budget process.

Debt Service Fund

The Debt Service Fund remains healthy, with revenues tracking ahead of budget and sufficient resources available to meet all scheduled debt obligations

AEDC Fund

The Economic Development Fund continues to perform strongly, with sales tax revenues at approximately 65% of budget and expenditures remaining well below budgeted levels at mid-year.

b. 2nd Quarter Investment Report

Candice Edmondson, City Manager, presented the second quarter investment report, noting that the City's cash and investment portfolio remained strong and in compliance with the Investment Policy. As of March 31, 2026, total cash and investments were approximately \$24.7 million. The City earned nearly \$200,000 in interest revenue during the quarter, with the majority of reserves invested in highly liquid and secure investment vehicles. Staff also reported that bank deposits remained significantly over-collateralized, providing a strong level of protection for City funds.

**c. City of Aledo Financial Profile and Debt Service Overview
Presentation by Erick Macha, Hilltop Securities**

Erick Macha, Hilltop Securities, gave the Council an in-depth analysis of the City's financial profile and debt service, including information on current debt and maturity dates.

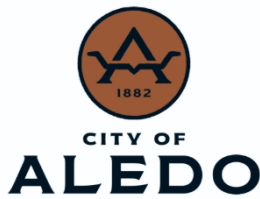

b. **Consider approval of the purchase of a Jetter for the Public Works Department from Texas Municipal Equipment in the amount of \$82,461.00**

Travis Askins, Public Works Director, presented the item to Council. He explained that the requested jetter would replace a 2008 model that has become increasingly costly to repair and maintain. The purchase would be funded out of the Utility Capital Project fund.

MOTION by Todd Covington, second by Summer Jones, to approve the purchase as presented. MOTION PASSED by unanimous vote.

c. **Consider approval of a contract renewal with Magna Flow for cleaning and sludge removal services.**

Travis Askins, Director of Public Works, presented the item to Council. He explained that staff is requesting approval of a two-year contract renewal with Magna Flow to continue providing cleaning and sludge removal services for both the water and wastewater systems, including line cleaning, quarterly lift station cleaning, sludge removal at the treatment plant, and support for emergency needs as they arise. Mr. Askins explained that this did limit the City's ability to use another vendor, but provided the City with a locked-in rate.

MOTION by Ben Clark, second by Todd Covington, to approve the renewal with MagnaFlow as presented. MOTION PASSED by unanimous vote.

d. **Discussion regarding future Ordinances related to Golf Carts and E-Bikes in the City of Aledo**

Carol Riddle, Chief of Police, presented Council with a broad overview of regulations for e-bikes and golf carts, including what the City of Aledo would be allowed to regulate and regulations in place in neighboring communities. Chief Riddle asked Council to submit their input and a draft ordinance would be brought to Council for approval at a later date. No action taken.

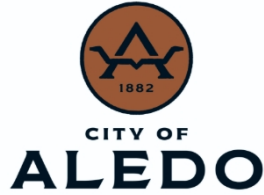

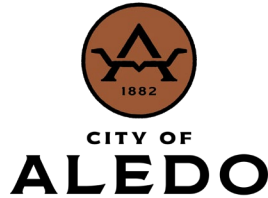

The proposed project would replace the existing at-grade railroad crossing with a grade-separated overpass, improving safety, mobility, and emergency access while reducing traffic delays for residents, businesses, and regional travelers. The project is expected to provide transportation benefits to Aledo and surrounding communities by enhancing connectivity and supporting continued regional growth.

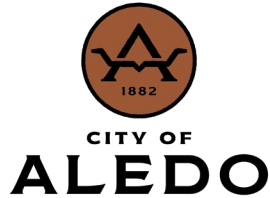

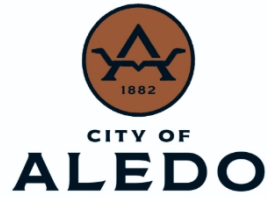

Summary:

The Police Chief will provide an overview of two proposed ordinances discussed at the previous council meeting for review and approval.

The proposed ordinance amends the existing "Traffic" Ordinance to "Traffic and Vehicles", and adds regulations related to golf carts, neighborhood electric vehicles, other types of recreational off-highway vehicles as well as bicycles and micromobility devices.

Included in the ordinance are state laws and the following provisions previously discussed:

- Children under the age of 17 must wear a helmet
- Children under the age of 17 must ride on sidewalks where available
- Limits the number of passengers in a golf cart to the number of seats available
- Prohibits children under the age of 4 from riding in a golf cart
- Prohibits operation of all other specialty vehicles on streets and roadways within city limits.

The ordinance was written with public safety in the forefront while ensuring residents can enjoy these types of vehicles and devices in a safe and responsible manner.

Recommendation:

It is the recommendation of the Police Chief to adopt this ordinance as written.

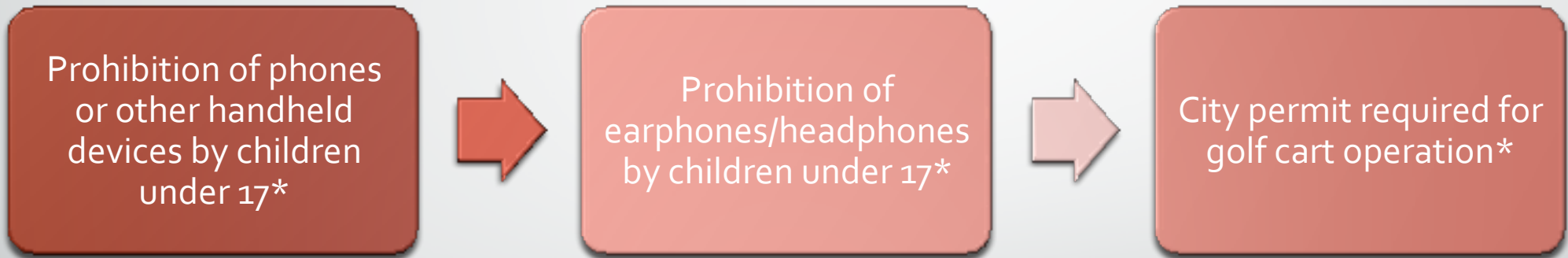

ORDINANCE NO. 2026-O-18

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ALEDO, TEXAS, AMENDING THE ALEDO MUNICIPAL CODE BY RENAMING CHAPTER 77, "TRAFFIC," TO "TRAFFIC AND VEHICLES," AND ADDING ARTICLE V, "VEHICLES," TO ADD REGULATIONS RELATED TO GOLF CARTS, NEIGHBORHOOD ELECTRIC VEHICLES, AND OTHER TYPES OF RECREATIONAL OFF- HIGHWAY VEHICLES AND BICYCLES AND MICROMOBILITY DEVICES; PROVIDING THAT THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE CUMULATIVE OF ALL ORDINANCES; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS HEREOF; PROVIDING A SAVINGS CLAUSE; PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION IN THE OFFICIAL NEWSPAPER; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City of Aledo, Texas (the "City"), is a home rule city acting under its charter adopted by the electorate pursuant to Article XI, Section 5 of the Texas Constitution and Chapter 9 of the Local Government Code; and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to update the Aledo Municipal Code to provide and maintain the safety of citizens who use streets, sidewalks, and other public places of the Town; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds it necessary for the protection of public safety to define what constitutes various vehicles, including, an all-terrain vehicle, bicycle, electric bicycle, golf carts, micromobility device, neighborhood electric vehicle, off-highway vehicle, recreational vehicle, and utility vehicle and to establish regulations that promote the safe use and operation of such vehicles;

WHEREAS, the City Council finds and determines the provisions of this Ordinance are necessary to protect the public, health, safety, and general welfare of City citizens and the public; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds and determines that the regulations herein are necessary and proper for carrying out its power to protect the government interest, welfare, and good order of the City; and

WHEREAS, the City Council is authorized by law to adopt the provisions contained herein and has complied with all the prerequisites necessary for the passage of this Ordinance, including but not limited to the Open Meetings Act.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ALEDO, TEXAS, THAT:

SECTION 1.

Chapter 77, "Traffic," of the Aledo Municipal Code is hereby retitled to read as: Chapter 77, "Traffic and Vehicles."

SECTION 2.

Chapter 77, "Traffic and Vehicles," of the Aledo Municipal Code is hereby amended by adding Article V, "Vehicles," to read as follows:

"ARTICLE V. – VEHICLES.

Sec. 77-75. – Definitions.

For the purpose of this Article, the following terms, words, and the derivations thereof shall have the meaning given herein:

All- terrain vehicle (ATV) means in accordance with Texas Transportation Code §551A.001 a motor vehicle that is:

- (a) equipped with a seat or seats for the use of:
 - (1) the rider; and
 - (2) a passenger, if the motor vehicle is designed by the manufacturer to transport a passenger;
- (b) designed to propel itself with three or more tires in contact with the ground;
- (c) designed by the manufacturer for off-highway use;
- (d) not designed by the manufacturer primarily for farming or lawn care;
- (e) not more than 50 inches wide, and
- (f) designed by the manufacturer for the operator to straddle the seat during operation.

Bicycle means, in accordance with Texas Transportation Code §541.201 (2), a device, excluding a moped, that is capable of being ridden solely using human power and has either:

- (a) two tandem wheels at least one of which is more than 14 inches in diameter;
- (b) three wheels, two of which are in parallel, and at least one of the three wheels is more than 14 inches in diameter; or
- (c) any number of wheels and adaptive technology that allows the device to be ridden by a person with a disability.

Child means a person younger than seventeen (17) years of age.

Daytime hours means the time period beginning one half hour before sunrise and ending one half hour after sunset. This time is also referred to as Civil Twilight as defined by the US Naval Observatory Data Service.

Driver means a person driving and having physical control over a vehicle.

Driver's license means an authorization issued by a state for the operation of a motor vehicle, including but not limited to a temporary license, provisional license, instructional permit, and an occupational license.

Electric bicycle means, in accordance with Texas Transportation Code, § 664.001(4), a bicycle equipped with fully operable pedals and an electric motor of fewer than 750 watts with a top assisted speed of twenty-eight miles per hour (28 mph) or less. Class 1 electric bicycle, Class 2 electric bicycle, and Class 3 bicycle shall have the same meaning as those assigned in Texas Transportation Code §664.001.

Golf cart means a motor vehicle, whether gas or electric, designed by the manufacturer primarily for use on a golf course. The term, as used herein, shall include a specific restriction that a permitted golf cart shall have an attainable top speed of not greater than twenty-five miles per hour (25 mph). Specifically excluded from this definition are motorized conveyances commonly referred to as ATVs.

Helmet means properly fitted protective headgear that is not structurally damaged and that conforms to the standards of the American National Standards Institute, the American Society for Testing and Materials, the Snell Memorial Foundation, or any federal agency having regulatory jurisdiction over bicycle helmets, as applicable, at the time of the manufacture of the helmet.

Highway means, in accordance with Texas Transportation Code § 541.302 (5), the width between the boundary lines of a publicly maintained way, any part of which is open to the public for vehicular travel.

License plate means, in accordance with Texas Transportation Code §551A.052 (Unregistered Off- road Vehicle License Plate), a reflectorized vehicle identifier issued pursuant to the rules and regulations promulgated by the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles to serve as evidence of a vehicle's registration.

Micromobility device means small, lightweight vehicles or devices incapable of operating at a top-assisted speed faster than twenty-eight miles per hour (28 mph) and driven by one (1) person. These devices include, but are not limited to, electric bicycles, electric motor-assisted scooters, manual scooters, electric skateboards, segways, hoverboards, skateboards with one or more wheels, or similar devices. Gas-powered devices and motorized carts are not included in this definition.

Motor-assisted scooter shall have the same meaning assigned by Texas Transportation Code, § 551.351(1), as it exists or may be amended, and includes a self-propelled device with at least two wheels in contact with the ground during operation; a braking system capable of stopping the device under typical operating conditions; a gas or electric motor forty (40) cubic centimeters or less; a deck designed to allow a person to stand or sit while operating the device; and the ability to be propelled by human power alone.

Neighborhood Electric Vehicle (NEV) means a vehicle that can attain a maximum speed of thirty-five miles per hour (35 mph) on a paved level surface and complies with Federal Motor Vehicle Safety Standard 500 for low-speed vehicles.

Off-highway vehicle means, in accordance with Texas Transportation Code § 551A.001 (1-d), an all-terrain vehicle (ATV) or recreational off-highway vehicle (ROV), a sand rail, or utility vehicle.

Operator means a person driving and having physical control over a vehicle defined in this section.

Owner means the person(s) holding the legal title to a vehicle defined in this section or who leases a vehicle defined in this section for their own personal use or for the use of a third party; whether for private or commercial retail purposes.

Pocket bike or mini motorbike means in accordance with Texas Transportation Code § 551.351(2), a self-propelled vehicle that is equipped with an electric motor or internal combustion engine having a piston displacement of less than 50 cubic centimeters, is designed to propel itself with not more than two wheels in contact with the ground, has a seat or saddle for the use of the operator, is not designed for use on a highway, and is ineligible for a certificate of title under Chapter 501 of the Texas Transportation Code. This term does not include a moped or motorcycle, an electric bicycle, motorized mobility device, electric personal assistive mobility device, or neighborhood electric vehicle.

Public street(s), specific to this section, means the public roadways of the city and the private roadways for which the Texas Transportation Code has been applied by council action regardless of its designation as a road, alley, avenue, highway, route, boulevard, etc. that:

- (a) has a posted speed limit of thirty-five miles per hour (35 mph) or less;
- (b) provides for no more than two (2) lanes of vehicular traffic per direction; or
- (c) is not designated as part of either the state or federal highway system or farm to market road system.

Public way or public property means real property owned, leased, or controlled by the city or a political subdivision of the state, a governmental entity or agency, or any property that is publicly owned or maintained or dedicated to public use, including, but not limited to, a path, trail, sidewalk, alley, dedicated open space, and a public park facility.

Recreational off-highway vehicle (ROV) means a motor vehicle that is:

- (a) Equipped with a seat or seats for the use of:
 - (1) the rider; and
 - (2) a passenger or passengers, if the vehicle is designed by the manufacturer to transport a passenger or passengers;
- (b) designed to propel itself with four (4) or more tires in contact with the ground;
- (c) designed by the manufacturer for off-highway use by the operator only; and
- (d) not designed by the manufacturer primarily for farming or lawn care.

Roadway means, in accordance with Texas Transportation Code §541.302(11), a portion of a highway, other than the berm or shoulder, that is improved, designed, or ordinarily used for vehicular travel. If a highway includes at least two separate roadways, the term applies to each roadway separately.

Sidewalk means, in accordance with Texas Transportation Code §316.001(3), the portion of a municipal street between the curb lines or lateral lines of a roadway and the adjacent property lines that is improved and designed for or is ordinarily used for pedestrian travel.

Slow moving vehicle emblem means a triangular emblem that conforms to standards and specifications and displayed in accordance with Chapter 547 of the Texas Transportation Code, as amended.

Utility Vehicle means, in accordance with Texas Transportation Code 551A.001(6), a motor vehicle that is not a golf cart or lawn mower and is:

- (a) equipped with side-by-side seating for the use of the operator and passenger;
- (b) designed to propel itself with at least four (4) tires in contact with the ground;
- (c) designed by the manufacturer for off highway use only; and
- (d) designed by the manufacturer primarily for utility work and not for recreational purposes.

Sec. 77-76. – Golf carts, neighborhood electric vehicles, and other types of recreational off-highway vehicles.

(a) *Operation.*

(1) Locations of use.

- a. Golf Carts are permitted to be operated on a public street as defined by this section.
- b. Neighborhood Electric Vehicles are permitted to be operated on a public street or highway where the posted speed limit is forty-five miles per hour (45 mph) or less, in accordance with Texas Transportation Code §551.303.
- c. Golf carts and NEV's may drive across intersections where the cross street has a posted speed limit of more than what is specified by law or this ordinance even if the cross street is otherwise prohibited by such.

(2) Equipment and safety requirements for golf carts.

- a. Golf carts are permitted to operate on public streets as defined by this section and shall meet the following equipment and safety requirements in accordance with Texas Transportation Code §551.402, § 551.4041, §601.051, and §521.021:
 - 1. license plate issued by the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles;
 - 2. Two (2) working head lamps and two (2) working tail lamps;

3. Reflectors (two front, amber in color; two rear, red in color);
 4. Operational parking brake;
 5. Mirrors;
 6. Slow moving vehicle emblem on the rear;
 7. Proof of financial responsibility (proof of insurance on golf cart);
 8. Operator must possess a valid driver's license.
- (3) The number of occupants in a golf cart shall be limited to the seating capacity as designed by the manufacturer. The operator shall ensure that all occupants remain seated while the golf cart is in motion and use any safety devices such as seatbelts that the manufacturer has installed. The operator shall never allow any person to ride in the lap of another person, to share the seat of any other person, or to be held by any other person while the golf cart is in motion.
- (4) Passengers under four (4) years of age are prohibited from riding in golf carts.
- (b) *Restrictions.*
- (1) All-terrain vehicles, off-highway vehicles, pocket bikes, mini motor bikes, recreational off-highway vehicles, and utility vehicles are prohibited from operating on highways, roadways, sidewalks, or public streets as defined by this section within the City limits of Aledo.
 - (2) Exceptions. golf carts, all-terrain vehicles, off-highway vehicles, recreational off-highway vehicles, and utility vehicles operated for official government business by the City of Aledo are exempt from regulation by this ordinance.
- (c) *Penalty.* Any person, firm, corporation, agent, or employee thereof who violates any of the provisions of this article shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined for each offense as provided in Section 1-10 of the Aledo Municipal Code. Each violation of any provision of this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense. Each day that a violation, or violations, is permitted to exist shall constitute a separate offense.

Sec. 77-77. - Bicycles and micromobility devices.

- (a) *Operation*
- (1) Locations of use.
 - a. Bicycles and micromobility devices shall only be operated on a highway, roadway, or public property during daytime hours, except

as otherwise provided herein. The operator of the bicycle or micromobility device shall obey all state traffic laws, city ordinances, and follow the “Rules of the Road.”

- b. Children under the age of seventeen (17) must ride bicycles or micromobility devices on sidewalks, where available, and obey all traffic devices. If no sidewalks are available, children may ride in the street but must obey all state traffic laws, city ordinances, and follow the “Rules of the Road” and resume riding on a sidewalk as soon as available.
- (2) Safety requirements. Children under the age of seventeen (17) shall wear a helmet when operating a bicycle or micromobility device.
 - (3) Equipment required. All bicycles and micromobility devices operated outside of daytime hours on a roadway, highway, or public property must be equipped with the following:
 - a. Lamp on the front of the device that emits a white light visible from a distance of at least 500 feet in front of the device and;
 - b. Red reflector on the back of the device that is visible when directly in front of lawful upper beams of motor vehicle headlamps from all distances from 50 to 300 feet to the rear of the device, or a lamp that emits a red light visible from a distance of 500 feet to the rear of the device.
 - c. All classes of *electric bicycles* shall display the manufacturer sticker stating the class of *electric bicycle*, top assisted speed of the *electric bicycle*, and the motor wattage of the *electric bicycle*, as required by Texas Transportation Code §664.002.
 - d. Class 3 *electric bicycles* shall be equipped with a speedometer as required by Texas Transportation Code §664.004.
 - (4) Pedestrian safety.
 - a. An operator of a bicycle or micromobility device shall yield the right of way to pedestrians.
 - b. The operator of a bicycle or micromobility device shall slow to a safe speed and provide verbal or audible warning to pedestrians from a reasonable distance before passing them.
- (b) *Responsibility for child operators.*

- (1) It shall be unlawful for a parent or guardian to allow or permit a child to operate a bicycle or micromobility device on any highway, roadway, or public property, in violation of any provision of this section.
 - a. There is a presumption that a parent allowed a child to operate a bicycle or a micromobility device on any highway, roadway, or public property, and in any area restricted or prohibited by this section or any other ordinance.
- (2) It shall be unlawful for a parent to knowingly allow or permit a child to operate a bicycle or micromobility device upon a highway, roadway, or public property unless the child is wearing a helmet.
- (c) *Penalty.* Any person, firm, corporation, agent, or employee thereof who violates any of the provisions of this Article shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined for each offense as provided in Section 1-10 of the Aledo Municipal Code. Each violation of any provision of this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense. Each day that a violation is permitted to exist shall constitute a separate offense.”

SECTION 3.

This Ordinance shall be cumulative of all provisions of ordinances and of the Aledo Municipal Code, as amended, except where the provisions are in direct conflict with the provisions of other ordinances, in which event the conflicting provisions of the other ordinances are hereby repealed.

SECTION 4.

It is hereby declared to be the intention of the City Council that the phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs, and sections of this Ordinance are severable, and if any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, or section of this Ordinance shall be declared unconstitutional by the valid judgment or decree of any court of competent jurisdiction, such unconstitutionality shall not affect any of the remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs, and sections of this Ordinance, since the same would have been enacted by the City Council without the incorporation in this Ordinance of any such unconstitutional phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, or section.

SECTION 5.

Any person, firm, or corporation who violates, disobeys, omits, neglects, refuses, or fails to comply with, or who resists the enforcement of any provision of this Ordinance shall be fined in accordance with Section 1-10 of the Aledo Municipal Code, for each offence. Each day that a violation is permitted to exist shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 6.

All rights and remedies of the City are expressly saved as to any and all violations of the provisions of the Aledo Municipal Code, as amended, which have accrued at the time of the effective date of this Ordinance; and, as such accrued violations and all pending litigation, both civil and criminal, whether pending in court or not, under such ordinances, shall not be affected by this Ordinance, but may be prosecuted until final disposition by the court.

SECTION 7.

The City Secretary of the City is hereby directed to publish the caption, penalty clause, and effective date clause in the official newspaper as required by the City Charter.

SECTION 8.

This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as required by law, and it is so ordained

Summary:

The City of Aledo solicited applications for the position of Municipal Judge and received nine (9) applications. Following review of the applications, City Council selected four (4) candidates to participate in interviews, which were conducted on June 8, 2026.

Pursuant to the City of Aledo Code of Ordinances, the Municipal Judge is appointed by a majority vote of the City Council for a two-year term and may be reappointed to successive terms.

City Council is considering the appointment of Cass Robert Callaway as Chief Municipal Judge of the Aledo Municipal Court for a two-year term beginning June 18, 2026, and continuing through midnight on June 18, 2028.

The attached Professional Services Agreement establishes compensation and the terms and conditions of service for the Chief Municipal Judge. The proposed resolution appoints Mr. Callaway as Chief Municipal Judge, approves the Professional Services Agreement, and authorizes the Mayor to execute the agreement on behalf of the City.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends City Council approve Resolution 2026-R-11 appointing Cass Robert Callaway to serve as Chief Municipal Judge of the Aledo Municipal Court and approving a professional services agreement.

Fiscal Impact:

Per the terms of the professional services agreement, the Chief Municipal Judge will receive a monthly flat fee of \$1,500.00 for all work performed as a judge and as a magistrate for the City including any and all related administrative work.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ALEDO, TEXAS, THAT:

**SECTION 1.
APPOINTMENT**

Cass Robert Callaway is hereby appointed Chief Municipal Judge of the Aledo Municipal Court for a two-year term commencing June 18, 2026, and continuing through midnight on June 18, 2028, unless sooner removed in accordance with applicable law.

**SECTION 2.
PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT**

The City Council hereby approves the Professional Services Agreement attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference and authorizes the Mayor to execute the agreement on behalf of the City.

**SECTION 3.
EFFECTIVE DATE**

This Resolution shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage.

**PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT
FOR CHIEF MUNICIPAL COURT JUDGE/MAGISTRATE**

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into this 18th day of June 2026 by and between the City of Aledo, Texas, a municipal corporation of the State of Texas, hereinafter referred to as “City,” and Cass Robert Callaway, hereinafter referred to as “Chief Judge”.

WHEREAS, on Thursday, June 18, 2026, the City Council of the City of Aledo, Texas, approved Resolution Number 2026-R-11, in which the City Council appointed Cass Robert Callaway to serve as the Chief Municipal Judge of the Aledo Municipal Court and approved a professional services agreement to be executed by the Mayor.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and benefits provided herein, the foregoing premises agreed upon by the parties and incorporated herein, and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto agree to the following:

I. EFFECTIVE DATE AND APPOINTMENT OF CHIEF JUDGE

A. The City does hereby **APPOINT** and contract for the services of Cass Robert Callaway to serve as the Chief Municipal Judge and Magistrate for and under the laws of the State of Texas, for a term of two years, beginning on Thursday June 18, 2026 and continuing through midnight June 18, 2028 and subject to TEXAS GOVERNMENT CODE Section 29.005, with all powers, rights and duties of said appointment and as provided by the City Charter and subject to the terms and conditions herein.

B. The Chief Judge has been appointed in accordance with the City Charter (Sections 1.02 and 5.02), upon approval of the City Council.

C. The Chief Judge shall perform duties in compliance with City Ordinances, specifically but not limited to Section 42-3.

II. TERM AND TERMINATION

A. The Chief Judge shall serve at the pleasure of the City Council and at such times as determined necessary by the Chief Judge or by City for the proper administration of the City of Aledo, Texas Municipal Court and for the provision of the services identified in this Agreement. This Agreement and the Chief Judge’s services may be terminated at any time by the City Council, in accordance with applicable state law. The services of Chief Judge shall be utilized by City on an as-needed basis.

B. If the Chief Judge desires to terminate this Agreement, he shall provide a minimum thirty (30) day notice to the City and ensure availability to cover any dockets that he is already scheduled to serve within such thirty (30) day period.

III. COMPENSATION OF CHIEF JUDGE

The City shall compensate the Chief Judge as follows:

A. As compensation for all required services herein during the term of this Agreement, the City agrees to pay to the Chief Judge a monthly flat fee of \$1,500.00 for all work performed as a judge and as a magistrate for the City including any and all related administrative work.

B. The Chief Judge, only for the purposes of income tax withholding, shall be treated as an employee of the City pursuant to INTERNAL REVENUE CODE section 3401(c), as the Chief Judge is an appointed city/public official/officer. As such the City shall be responsible for withholding income tax, social security, and Medicare taxes. This treatment, for purposes of income tax withholding only, and no other, shall not create any property right or interest in employment with the City. Further, this treatment, for purposes of income tax withholding only, does not entitle the Chief Judge to any healthcare, retirement, bonus, or other traditional city employee benefit. For all other purposes, the Chief Judge is an independent member of the Texas judiciary and not a city employee.

C. The City shall pay the Chief Judge per the City's established payroll practices and procedures and by direct deposit, if available.

D. The City is not responsible for paying for any required state training, professional membership dues, professional organization membership dues, state occupational tax, or any other professional related fee or dues incurred by the Chief Judge in his role as a Texas municipal court judge and licensed Texas attorney.

E. The City shall provide and pay for a judicial robe for use in Aledo Municipal Court proceedings.

IV. DUTIES OF CHIEF JUDGE

A. During the duration of this Agreement, the Chief Judge shall preside over the City of Aledo Municipal Court and perform all the duties set forth below.

B. The Chief Judge shall perform the functions and duties specified in the applicable sections of the City Charter and City Ordinances and shall perform such other legally permissible and proper duties and functions as the City shall assign from time to time, including but not limited to keeping the policies and procedures of the Court up to date.

C. The Chief Judge shall perform all services and duties customarily performed by a judge of a municipal court in the State of Texas.

D. The Chief Judge shall comply with all provisions of the CODE OF JUDICIAL CONDUCT, the ALEDO CITY CHARTER, Chapter 29 of the TEXAS GOVERNMENT CODE, and all other applicable laws pertaining to the

operations of the Aledo Municipal Court, and duties as a Magistrate. In the event of a conflict between the terms of this Agreement and said Code, Charter, statutes, or laws, the terms of said Code, Charter, statute, or laws shall govern.

E. The Chief Judge shall prepare and coordinate the docket schedule with the court staff. The Chief Judge shall timely perform all duties, including, but not limited to, the dockets set forth in the docket schedule.

F. The Chief Judge shall spend adequate time in addition to scheduled dockets each month at the court to assist the staff, police department, code officers, etc. with any court-related matters, to work on court policy and special projects, and to see walk-in defendants.

G. The Chief Judge shall provide magistrate services, if requested by Parker County, as detailed in the On Call Procedures addressed below.

H. The Chief Judge is required to keep abreast of state law and local ordinances, including state-mandated fees for the City of Aledo Municipal Court. Although a recognized function of judicial discretion, the Chief Judge shall endeavor to enforce the law consistently and within suggested state guidelines and pursuant to the rules adopted by the City and shall be uniform and consistent in the implementation of judicial policy in accordance with State law and local ordinances. The Chief Judge shall apply the law and enter judgments in accordance with State law and local ordinances, shall abide by all mandatory provisions of the law, and shall not create or apply exceptions where none exist under law. Judicial discretion shall only be applied where allowed under law.

I. The Chief Judge shall be the liaison between any alternate judges and City departmental staff. The Chief Judge shall provide general supervision and guidance for any alternate judges.

J. The Chief Judge shall also participate, when able, in community activities and programs that are sponsored by the city or court (i.e. Citizens academies, festivals, National Night Out, scout events, juror thank you projects, and other community activities).

V. STANDING ORDERS

A. The City Council desires uniformity and consistency in the implementation of judicial policy in accordance with state law and local ordinances. Therefore, the Chief Judge shall utilize the "Bench Book" produced by the Texas Municipal Court Education Center as a guide in developing all standing orders and court procedures.

B. The Chief Judge shall promulgate and maintain judicial policies and procedures and standing orders to address the daily administration of the municipal court and trial procedures, for matters such as dismissals, installment payments, deferred disposition, and continuances. Any changes to the rules of the court or standing orders must be in writing and acknowledged by the Chief

Judge. No policy will be implemented by the clerks of the court prior to the same being in written form and executed by the Chief Judge.

VI. ON CALL PROCEDURES

The Chief Judge shall provide the Aledo Police Department a protocol for accessing the Chief Judge, alternate judges, and county magistrates for all magistrate requests including blood warrants, premises search warrants, animal cruelty seizures, evidentiary search warrants, arrest warrants, etc. providing on call availability 24/7/365 coverage. The Chief Judge shall be available per that protocol and endeavor in all things to respond expeditiously to all emergency requests. The Chief Judge shall keep the Court and the Aledo Police Department informed of his current contact information for all on call needs.

VII. GENERAL PROVISIONS

A. This Agreement represents the entire and integrated Agreement between the City and the Chief Judge and supersedes all prior negotiations and representations and/or Agreements either written or oral. This Agreement may be amended only by written instrument signed by both the City and the Chief Judge. The Chief Judge further states that he has carefully read the foregoing Agreement, understands the contents thereof and signs the same as the Chief Judge's own free act.

B. This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Texas and venue for any proceeding related to this Agreement shall be in Parker County, Texas. This Agreement is not assignable.

C. If any provision, or any portion thereof, contained in this Agreement is held to be unconstitutional, invalid, or unenforceable, the remainder of this Agreement, or portion thereof, shall be deemed severable, shall not be affected, and shall remain in full force and effect.

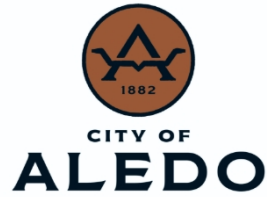

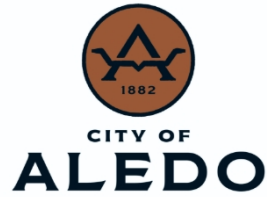

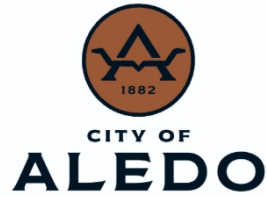
